OAR 581-022-2220	The elementary schools have a room dedicated to the students who need isolation due to respiratory symptoms. The district RN is available by phone if she is not available in person. There are beds for students to lay down if they are ill and wait for their families to pick them up to take them home. Students who are ill with fever and respiratory symptoms may be isolated with a mask on and sent home. Hepa filters will be changed each month and MERV-13 air filters will be added to all buildings. On days that are 60 or warmer, windows will be opened to increase ventilation. When possible, windows will be opened on buses. Staff will not use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. Staff will consider the need for increased ventilation in areas where students with special healthcare needs receive medication or treatments. Ventilation systems will be checked regularly. • Schools with HVAC systems should ensure all filters are regularly maintained and replaced as necessary to ensure the proper functioning of the system. • All intake ports that provide outside air to the HVAC system should be cleaned, maintained, and cleared of any debris that may affect the function and performance of the ventilation system. • Keep windows open or cracked when possible for ventilation • HVAC systems in all schools have been set to circulate 25% outside air during school hours. (6:30a.m 5 p.m.) This means pulling outside air into the HVAC system to replace the inside air.
